### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

A study of the overall system of administration and management in criminal justice from evolving strategies, human behaviors, and organizational behavior. The course will look into areas of motivation, attitude, values, etc. to provide the student with the knowledge in managing organizations and people. The student will be exposed to leadership styles, communication methods and decision processes.

1. Describe the various leadership/management theories, skills and styles.

  - Describe the supervisor's responsibility to motivate and empower employees and compare the influences from various forms of motivation.
  - Describe attitude, beliefs, values, motivation and group work as it applies to supervision and management of people.

- Explain team leadership and team building and evaluate how it applies to police organizations.

3. Demonstrate critical thinking, research and writing skills on management issues.
